POSTCARDS FROM B.W. COOPER




In order to honor and acknowledge the history of the B.W. Cooper Neighborhood and its residents, participants were asked to share their experiences by answering one of the following prompts:






EARLY ACTION PROJECT



ART LIGHTS ON GALVEZ STREET: The Choice Neighborhood Grant provides funding for an Early Action Project that can be built within the next year. The project focuses on working together with residents to improve the community. For this activity we asked residents to vote on which type of light art installation they would like to see added along Galvez Street. The options below reflect the votes each precedent theme got. The flower lights were the most popular amongst residents. Many believed that those lights reflected their culture and felt more "New Orleans" than any of the other potential light projects.











VISION FOR THE FUTURE



This station focused on creating a community vision for the future of the B.W. Cooper Neighborhood. Participants were asked to choose 3 icons that represent their vision for the community's future from a collection of graphics. The icons were captured and populated on a large banner hung on the wall, creating a 'vision board' for the neighborhood in real time. Based on the icons participants chose, it can be said that they share a similar vision for the future. Community health and well-being is a priority. There's a demand for health care services, amenities, as well as resources for families and the youth. Some topics of discussion included the following:

- The need for lighting
- Lack of sense of safety
- The preservation and celebration of their music, culture and history
- Additional recreation and resource spaces for youth









MAPPING THE NEIGHBORHOOD



This station focused on understanding resident's current experiences in the B.W. Cooper Neighborhood. A large-scale map of the neighborhood was set up for residents to identify where public invesment (green dots) is most needed to improve streets, parks and public spaces, and where private investment (orange dots) is most needed to build or repair homes, businesses and services. The following are initial ideas that emerged from the activity:



- The preference between public and private investment is almost even amongst the participants with 23 interested in private investment and 26 interested in public investment.
- Most of the investment is located in the lower end of the target neighborhood, including the Hoffman Triangle.
- Residents emphasized the need for investment near MLK due to vacancies.
- Rosenwald Center is identified with need for public investment.
